

Strategic Plan impacts undergrads this fall

This fall, the initial elements of the Fraternity and Foundation's joint program strategic plan, formalized in early 2016, will debut across every Sigma Chi undergraduate chapter in North America with the launch of the **Sigma Chi U** online system and its centerpiece, eight-week **Preparation for Brotherhood (P4B)** new-member education program (see page 7).

Pilot tested in 2015-16, P4B provides a uniform experience across our Fraternity, with weekly courses that highlight our

seven Founders and program modules that focuses on relevant issues on college campuses today.

Its launch ensures that each and every new Sigma Chi will engage in values-based leadership training from their first days.

Sigma Chi will also have a proactive presence on college campuses with the

pilot test of **chapter support professionals** thanks to a grant from the Foundation. These individuals will visit chapters and consult with brothers on site.

Along with these new initiatives, a fifth week of Horizons, a refreshed Mission 365 workshop, and growth to the Sigma Chi Lifeline, Sigma Chi Crossroads and Jordan Initiative modules have also been completed.

Golf event, Foundation support mental health and suicide awareness

CANTON, GA — His untimely passing highlighted the recurring issue of mental health issues, suicide and depression in today’s collegiate scene.

In his honor, over 150 golfers, friends and family reunited to remember Keller Zibilich, **LOUISIANA STATE 2015**, and raise funds to support other Sigma Chi brothers who may experience depression or show signs of mental distress through the Sigma Chi Lifeline program, as well as an annual academic scholarship.

With a field full of participants and 60 additional hole sponsors, the third-annual Michael Keller Zibilich Charity Golf Tournament helped net \$32,000 for the Sigma Chi Lifeline program and Keller Zibilich Scholarship.

The tournament itself drew Sig brothers from seven different states, including the 2015-16 recipient of the Keller Zibilich Scholarship Layton Little, **MISSISSIPPI STATE 2019**, and Sigma Chi Foundation President & CEO Ashley Woods, **EAST TENNESSEE 2000**, and FDN governor Steve Goodroe, **GEORGIA 1971**.

In advance of the event, the Sigma Chi Foundation marked the second week of May as “Keller Zibilich Week” in support of Sigma Chi Lifeline and mental health awareness, netting an additional \$8,500 in Keller’s memory.

Sigma Chi honors Watsons

Joint Fraternity, Foundation effort results in world-class Museum of Sigma Chi

The work of a joint Fraternity and Foundation committee and a major fundraising effort catalyzed by Significant Sig and Order of Constantine Sig Chuck Watson, **OKLAHOMA STATE 1972**, and his wife, Kim, set the stage for a transformation of the museum that was once housed in the basement of the J. Dwight Peterson Sigma Chi International Fraternity Headquarters in Evanston, Ill.

The result is the Chuck and Kim Watson Museum of Sigma Chi, which made a private debut in April and officially opened during Sigma Chi Grand Council weekend in June.

Watson, the past chairman of the Sigma Chi Foundation, made an initial gift for the project to help cover a wide gap in funding and issued a match challenge to all Sigs.

“I thought the museum was a great way to not only to preserve our history but to tell the story of Sigma Chi,” said Watson. “It’s a gradually

increasing good story about a group of men that have continued to bond together and make an organization stronger and stronger each year.”

The campaign, launched in fall 2014 and extended through spring 2015, brought contributions from 41 brothers, who contributed the minimum \$2,500 toward the Watson challenge, and seven additional sponsorships to help raise the sufficient funds to complete the \$800,000 reconstruction of the museum and enhance other items.

“This was a great example of the partnership between the Fraternity and the Foundation,” said 63rd Grand Consul and museum committee chair Lee Beauchamp, **TEXAS A&M-COLLEGE STATION 1975**. “Our new museum really sets the bar for any Greek-letter organization’s museum going forward. We’re grateful for Chuck Watson’s support with this initiative, and are appreciative to each of our brothers who contributed.”

A member of the Foundation's William Lewis Lockwood giving society, Watson has been a staunch advocate of Sigma Chi's values-based leadership and scholarship efforts over the years. He helped steer the largest fundraising campaign in the Foundation's history in 2005-06, and, as the Foundation's chairman from 2006-2012, helped the Foundation board adopt a strategic plan to move towards a fundraising aim that keyed a shift to the many programming opportunities that are available to undergraduate brothers today.

When Watson learned of the museum drive, the decision to lend his name and help bolster the project with a match challenge was a no-brainer.

"From the minute I met the Sigma Chi brothers when I was a rushee, to pledgeship and membership, I've always been intrigued by the history of Sigma Chi and our values," said Watson. "I think to preserve that in a way that's easily understood and remembered seemed to be very important to me."

In April, the Sigma Chi Fraternity Executive Committee and the Sigma

Chi Foundation's Board of Governors separately drafted resolutions to honor Watson's commitment to Sigma Chi via the naming of the new museum — a fitting tribute to a champion of the betterment of Sigma Chi.

"Walking through that museum, it feels like it's bigger than it really is," Watson said. "It was very, very well done and I think it tells the story the way I wanted it to tell it. If you're a Sigma Chi, you can't help but go through that and feel honored and blessed to have been associated with the Fraternity over

the years.

"It's so inclusive. If you look at almost every decade, it seems like there was something in there. I felt the interactive nature of it was really cool. It makes people stop and stare and want to participate and learn.

"I think the longer you're there, the more you want to stay there and learn more about the history. There's nothing more exciting for a museum than to have its visitors feel like they want to stay longer and get closer to the magic."

Harbaugh honored by Foundation

On June 30, a decade of tireless service came to an official end as Significant Sig Greg Harbaugh, **PURDUE 1978**, retired from his post as Sigma Chi Foundation President and CEO.

"It has been my honor to serve as President and CEO of the Sigma Chi Foundation for these 10 years," Harbaugh said in the 2015 Annual Report. "I believe in the Sigma Chi vision. I hope our brothers will agree that over the last 10 years we have held the flame high."

Harbaugh arrived at the Sigma Chi Foundation in 2006 after more than two decades with NASA with a vision of a values-based organization that set high expectations for itself, that is accountable, that met every commitment, remained true to its word and provided an example for how to achieve with excellence. Mission accomplished.

With Harbaugh at the helm, this vision set the Sigma Chi Foundation apart from every other Greek-letter fraternity and sorority foundation. Sigma Chi delivered significantly more leadership program and academic scholarship support than any other fraternity foundation — more than 6.4 times the average and \$860,000 more annually than the second ranked organization. As support at other Greek-letter organizations declined on average, the Sigma Chi Foundation's donor base expanded and leadership and scholarship opportunities increased across the board.

In light of his vision and service, the Foundation will honor Harbaugh with the Greg and Carol Harbaugh Award, the third named Founders' Scholarship award, presented to one of the top-seven undergraduate applicants annually by the Sigma Chi Foundation's Board of Governors thanks to generous donor support. He will also be permanently recognized with a portrait on the walls of the Foundation wing within Sigma Chi's International Fraternity Headquarters building.

Governor Emeritus Ben Fisher dies at 93

A preeminent Washington, D.C. communications law attorney and one of two second-generation Sigs to serve upon the Sigma Chi Foundation's Board of Governors, Significant Sig Benjamin Chatburn Fisher, **ILLINOIS 1948**, passed away in April at age 93.


The son of 32nd Grand Consul Ben S. Fisher, **ILLINOIS 1913**, Fisher's legal career spanned six decades during which he counseled many of the largest and most successful operators within the communications industry including Sinclair Broadcast group and Hughes Communications, for whom he helped obtain DIRECTV's first license

to provide a direct-to-home broadcast service.

After serving in the U.S. Army during World War II, Fisher became an active member of Sigma Chi at the University of Illinois where he was awarded the International Balfour Award. He attended Harvard Law School and served as an editor on the Harvard Law Review before launching his successful legal career.

Fisher joined the Sigma Chi Foundation's Board of Governors in 1992 and was named a Governor Emeritus after a decade of service.

Fisher, whose wife Jean passed in 2015, is survived by two sons and three grandchildren.

These funds support our general academic scholarships annually, increased chapter developmental efforts, as well as the opportunity for every Sigma Chi chapter to request one of the many workshops concerning everything from drug and alcohol abuse to recruitment.

SIGMA CHI U

SIGMA CHI U is the Fraternity's new and interactive way for its brothers to learn and engage. It is comprised of a full menu of program content that is made available to each undergraduate brother online. Online and in-person small group discussions, facilitated by professionally trained alumni brothers, will bring the content home to each brother.

The programs will address all of the relevant issues found on college campuses today, such as alcohol and drug abuse, hazing, sexual misconduct, mental health awareness and suicide along with interactive mentoring and support from professionally trained alumni.

The content will address leadership skills including strategic planning, personality styles, the fundamentals of how to be a values-based leader, and functional skill training for chapter officers.

This fall, Sigma Chi will formally roll out Sigma Chi U's **Preparation for Brotherhood** (see right), a module that will provide a base education for every

Sigma Chi, starting in pledgship, and continuing through their entire Sigma Chi undergraduate experience.

Program content includes existing curricula from values-based leadership programs such as Sigma Chi Crossroads (drug and alcohol prevention), Sigma Chi Lifeline (suicide and mental health awareness), Jordan Initiative (anti-hazing module) and facets of Sigma Chi chapter retreat programming (such as accountability and responsibility and sexual misconduct prevention).

Sigma Chi U will also provide chapters with officer-specific leadership preparation previously only available each summer at Balfour Leadership Training Workshop, a revitalized Big Brother program and leadership training modules from the lauded Sigma Chi Huntsman Horizons Leadership Summit. It will also provide an avenue for alumni who wish to engage with the Fraternity in roles as Chapter Advisor, Grand Praetor and program facilitator, among others.

PREPARATION FOR BROTHERHOOD



- Eight-week education program that ensures each new pledge, regardless of chapter, receives the same education of Sigma Chi.
- This program takes a blended learning approach of in-person and online activities using the Sigma Chi U learning management system, including parts of the 1-week experience spread throughout the entire pledge program.
